## CHECKLIST

### Gain relevant experience and develop your skills:

- Narrow your career choices and discuss them with a career counselor, professors, and professionals to get advice about how to achieve your goals.
- Secure a career-related internship and fulfill your LEAP requirement. Meet with the internship program director for details about how to find and register an internship experience.
- Identify professors and supervisors who could serve as references for your job and internship applications.
- Learn to effectively market your skills and experiences by attending CDC programs, workshops, employer presentations, and career fairs.
- Set up a practice interview or discuss interview preparation with a career counselor.
- Complete the [Career Ready Reflection Sheet](#).
- Participate in a job-shadowing experience. Consult with the CDC for alumni contacts and other resources.
- Research graduate and professional programs that align with your career goals. Create an application timeline and, if necessary, register and begin studying for entrance exams.
- Consider summer opportunities and activities that will help you develop marketable employment skills.
- Continue to update your résumé, cover letter(s), Handshake, and LinkedIn profiles. Get feedback from CDC staff.
- Learn how to navigate a professional job search and prepare for career fairs and on-campus recruitment opportunities.
- International students need to connect with the Global Engagement Center about required work documents.
