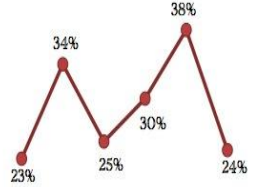

The following data is an aggregate of all courses in the given discipline from Fall 2013 course evaluation data.

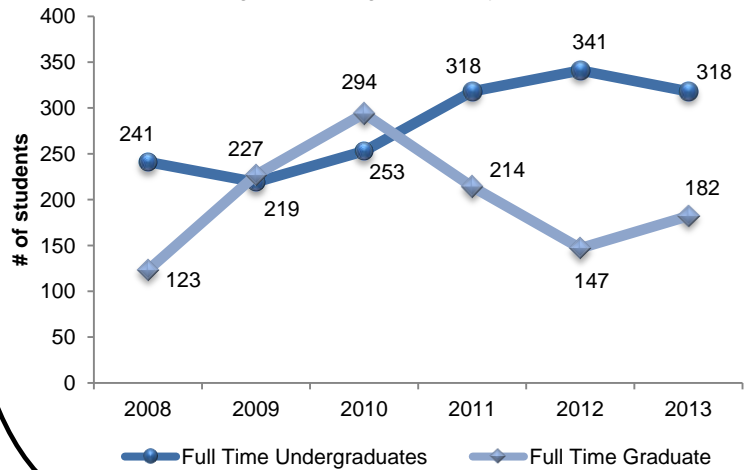
School of Business

March is National Women's History Month

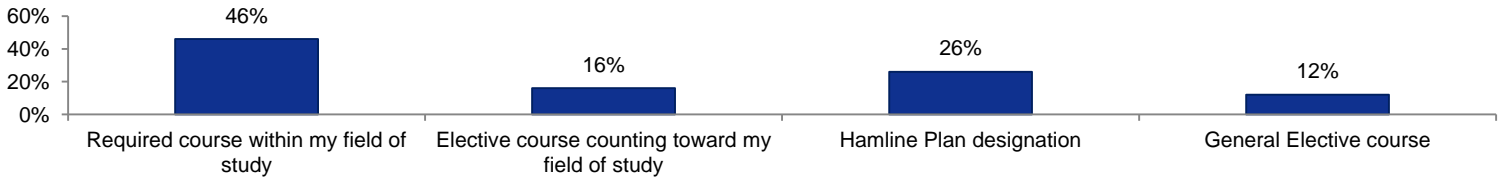
Enrollment of First Time First Year Degree Seeking Women by Year
